Metro Countywide Sustainability Planning Policy (Pending Approval)

Establishes a framework to:

- Better integrate sustainability in Metro Planning functions
- Complement and provide a framework to build upon Federal, state, regional, and local policies and plans
- Foster collaboration and partnerships



Provides guidance to:

- Encourage people to drive less and in more efficient vehicles
- Match transportation strategies with land-use patterns

Focus:

Background:

- Metro and SCAG have an ongoing collaborative partnership
- As part of that collaboration, Metro Sustainability was directly involved in the RTP/SCS process
- The SCAG-Metro Joint-Work Program was developed as a key component in implementing the RTP/SCS

This Program between SCAG and Metro is comprised of 11 implementation activities, each with long and short-termed agendas.

1. A Regional Sustainability
Working Group to monitor
progress and develop
recommendations for future plans

2. Sustainable Transportation
Demonstration Program that will provide local agencies with planning, programming, and/or capital funds to implement Compass Blueprint projects or other innovative, multimodal approaches







3.) First-Last Mile Strategic Plan will include policies and guidelines that serve as a resource for local governments seeking to partner with Metro and SCAG on improvements in transit catchment areas and inform the types and sizing of intermodal facilities that Metro should aim to provide at its stations/stops

4.) Countywide Safe Routes to School Plan to identify a strategy to help local communities establish new Safe Routes to School (SRTS) programs and to sustain and enhance existing efforts



5.) Regional PEV Readiness Plan-Identify the best locations for charging infrastructure based on market demand and travel patterns for plug-in electric vehicles. The Regional PEV Readiness Plan will become part of a larger effort to support regional sustainability while promoting economic development within the green technology sector.
